Tybee Bakery featuring Miss Korea

Even a seasoned foodie and the most adventurous of diners can rest assured that their dining experience at **Tybee Bakery featuring Miss Korea** will be, undoubtedly, a very special occasion. This is a once in a lifetime culinary and cultural opportunity.

The space is cozy, immediately comfortable, and rich with local history, having served as a train station on another part of the island, a private residence, an art gallery and a rehearsal space for celebrated local rockers Les Racquet, once upon a time.

There are two tables. Yes, the previous sentence is accurate, and for that reason the lunch and dinner process is unique, if a little unorthodox. Plan ahead. This is not fast food. Tybee Bakery & Miss Korea may be the antithesis of your typical dine-in restaurant model, because they champion a thoughtful, slow food experience over the turn and burn, drive-thru philosophy dominating the food & beverage landscape, and it's incredibly refreshing.

Simply call the day before and let hosts **Simon and Jeeyun** help tailor a wonderful gourmet meal based on your group's size, hunger, dietary

restrictions and/or favorite classic Korean dishes and homemade baked goods.

Jimmy, Alaina, Rick, Wen and I convened on the first Friday in February for a lovely lunch date that began with a hot cup of **Ginseng Tea**, slightly bitter and earthy, but filled with powerful antioxidants. A healthy foundation before the first course, a **Kimchi Pancake**, featuring napa cabbage and other vegetables fermented in-house, with a fantastic pop, courtesy of the Korean-spiced magic sauce and pickled daikon radish.

Winter's coldest day doesn't stand a chance when you treat yourself to a bowl of **Doenjang-jjigae**, a medium bodied and very nuanced fermented soybean paste soup, served boiling hot with potato, herbs and tofu.

Next up, **Japche**, a traditional dish of potato noodles, an oddly translucent and perfectly al dente base for young chives, organic kale and seasoned seasonal vegetables served home-style. An exceptional vegan dish.

The final course featured the Korean staple **Bokumbap**, a hearty mix of fried rice and kimchi topped with a perfectly fried over-easy egg. Break the yoke and indulge.

For dessert we completely annihilated an amazingly rich **Chocolate Brownie** with homemade whipped cream and fresh strawberries AND a decadent **Lemon Cheesecake** that paired perfectly with our hot mug of **Haitian Blue Dark Roast**.

If you haven't yet made your way to Tybee Bakery, you need to make plans to do so. They are located at 1204 US 80. Call ahead at 912-376-0002 and/or 912-441-6999. We will be back, frequently.

Ask a Backwoods Southern Lawyer

TO BLOW OR NOT TO BLOW

Recently The Tybee Beachcomber decided that it would try “Ask a Backwoods Southern Lawyer” as a regular column. Requests for questions were sent to the Beachcomber community. I always knew that to live on Tybee full-time, your brain had to function at a somewhat different frequency, but even I was surprised by the responses.

The first question submitted was “How long after your spouse goes missing should you report it?” The second was “How can I legally trick someone into marrying me?” Not wishing to spend the next twenty years with a tattooed toothless ex-biker named Bubba as a cellmate, I will pretend I never saw those. For self-incrimination purposes, I do hope they were submitted anonymously.

The third has a much more interesting title but, unfortunately, I understood the context in which it was asked. It was “To blow or not to blow” after one is stopped for a suspected DUI. There are, of course, enumerable sexually charged responses to that question and one could certainly wonder if the right response could result in leniency from the arresting officer, but I will treat it as a serious inquiry.

If an officer stops you because he or she believes you may be driving under the influence, then at some point in the process, you will be asked to submit to a DUI test of the officer’s choosing. Basically we are talking about a breath test or a blood test. Almost every time the officer will elect a breathalyzer, since it can be administered at the point of the stop, and then again at the station to verify the results. After submitting to the test requested by the officer, you do have a right to request an additional test, such as a blood test, but at your own expense. Since a blood test would require that you be transported to the nearest emergency room/certified lab, that request will not endear you to the officer. Chances are you have just increased the length of his shift by at least an hour.

Not too many years ago, DUI attorneys always advised their clients to request a blood test, since they were considered more accurate and many were of the mistaken belief that the delay would result in a lower blood-alcohol level. That may be true, but police have access to establish formulas that would extrapolate back to show your blood-alcohol level at the actual time of arrest. Many now believe that a request for an additional test will do little more than make the officer mad.

The point to keep in mind is that refusing the test requested by the officer (assuming all appropriate warnings were first given) carries a pretty stiff penalty.

First the officer will file a statutory affidavit that you refused the test and your license will automatically be suspended for a year or until such time as the underlying charge is resolved. Your refusal can also result in a presumption that the test results would show you were under the influence.

If you are stopped for suspicion of DUI, there is simply no good reason to refuse the officer’s request for a test. Take the test; be cordial to the officer; never argue with the person who has the right to either send you home or take you to jail; and hope that maybe you can work something out in court. You may rest assured that nothing is going to happen on the side of the road that will aid you in any way. There is nothing positive to be gained by refusing the test.

Grows Up: I just want to fish.



Spirit Animal: Owl. They see and know everything. They are very spiritual animals and Rodney is into Native American culture, being part native himself. One with the earth.

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
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

DRIFTWOOD FAUNA

The first thing I do while heading across a boardwalk for some beachcombing is scan along the beach to see if I see any “clumps” of stuff washed up. I like “clumps!” Sometimes they are tangles of plant material that might include purple and yellow Sea Whips, Rubbery Bryozoans, Whelk egg cases, Sponges, Anemones, and other animals. Other times they are chunks of driftwood, and often the driftwood will include its own fauna or collection of animals.

On larger pieces of wood that have floated offshore for a period of time, you might see Goose Barnacles attached. Unlike most barnacles that grow attached flat onto rocks and hard structures close to shore, Goose Barnacles only grow on floating objects far offshore. And they look very different from normal “acorn” barnacles that we see on our rock jetties. Goose Barnacles are so named because they have a long, fleshy stalk between its main body and its attachment; and this stalk was thought to look like a goose’s neck. Like regular barnacles, Goose Barnacles extend their feather-like feet to capture tiny plankton for food, but some reports indicate that Goose Barnacles also eat small fish and other floating pelagic animals like Portuguese-Man-of-War (That, I’d like to see!). So in many ways (anatomy, where they live, how they live) Goose Barnacles are weird compared to other barnacles.

Lots of pieces of driftwood will be full of small round holes. Sometimes the holes are empty and the animal that drilled it will be gone, but other times, if you look closely, you can find that drilling animal (or pieces of it) still down in there. *Martesia*, or Wood Piddock, is a small clam-like bivalve mollusk that drills holes about the diameter of a pencil into all sizes of driftwood. It settles on the wood and as it grows, it uses its shells to dig and drill deeper into the wood. Its shells are fairly thin so they will generally crumble when the animal dies, and often all you will see are the holes in the wood. But sometimes if you look closely down in the hole, you might find some of the shell fragments.



Probably the most famous driftwood borer is the Ship Worm. A Ship Worm really isn’t a worm, but is a bivalve mollusk like the Wood Piddock. Although the Wood Piddock uses its wooden burrow mostly for protection and still filters seawater for food, the Ship Worm is more like a termite and actually consumes the wood that it is burrowing through. They are thought to have internal bacteria that can digest cellulose so they can obtain energy from eating wood. On the surface of the wood, a Ship Worm leaves only a small, pin-hole opening; but as it grows deeper into the wood, it creates a wider round tunnel. At the end of the tunnel, deep into the wood, the Ship Worm has a couple of small shells. It lines the long tunnel with a thin coating of white limestone, and often in a piece of driftwood you can see the white lining of some of the tunnels.

So the next time you notice driftwood drying out along the high tide line, take a closer look and you might see signs of some of the animals that once called that thing its home.

March Fishing Forecast

Windy season has arrived, a good sign spring is near. Our days are becoming longer and the average temperature is rising. This time of year can provide a great bite if the weather allows you to get out after the fish. Always be prepared and watch the weather, as it will change fast.

PIER FISHING

Tybee jetties and beach can be pretty slow at the beginning of the month, but that doesn't mean it is not worth soaking some baits. Whiting, Black Drum and Sheepshead are around, and closer to the end of the month a few over slot Red Drum will be searching for food as well. To catch the Black Drum and Sheepshead, fish the pier or jetties. These fish will be using the structures to hang around. Fiddler Crabs will work for both species, but for the Black Drum you can also use Shrimp. To catch Whiting in March, you will want to fish the deeper holes and use a double dropper rig with Shrimp. If you want to soak a large piece of cut bait like mullet, that's when you will have a chance at the over slot Red Drum.



INSHORE

Inshore fishing will improve as the water temperature increases. Look for the Speckled Sea Trout in the rips near oyster beds and smaller creeks. I would use a sliding cork so you can adjust the depth until you find where they are hanging. This time of year I would start about 5 to 6 feet under the cork. Live Mud Minnows would be choice of bait. The local tackle shop sells these at an affordable price. The Red Drum are still pretty far up the creeks, but they will also be around the mud flats and oyster beds. Live Mud Minnows work great for these fish as well.

NEAR SHORE

Nearshore fishing is hot right now. The Sheepshead are fired up, eating every Fiddler Crab you care to drop down to them. I use a light action rod to feel the bite on these sly fish. They don't have the nickname of convicts for no reason. I use a 7 foot rod, light action tip, 3 ounce egg weight above a swivel. Below the swivel I use a 30 pound test leader about 10 to 12 inches long, tied to the sharpest live bait hook money can buy. When you start losing more fish than you catch, change out the hook, they will dull out fast. Also, on the reefs you will find that Black Sea Bass are plentiful. You will catch a few while Sheepshead fishing, but if you don't get your limit, use cut bait and find some live bottom and it shouldn't take you long.

OFF SHORE

Offshore fishing has been great. Vermillion Snapper, Triggerfish and Porgies are just about everywhere. It shouldn't take you too long to catch your limit if you are using Squid or small pieces of cut bait. Out here you will also find plenty of Amberjack and Almaco Jacks around. They can put up a great fight if using light tackle and butterfly or high speed jigs. For those willing to do some trolling on the ledges and out deep, the Wahoo and Blackfin Tuna and plenty of Little Tunny are around. Watch the temperature breaks and you will find the fish.

To Pay or Not to Pay

Maaaaaarghch. We got nothin'. Monosyllabic. Not punny. The only thing mildly related is "March of Dimes," and that has been well taken already. So without further ado, let's continue our 2019 series in content, if not title.

- 1) You're paying yourself first.
- 2) Your emergency fund has three months' expenses in it.
- 3) You are now here.

"Here" looks like different things to different people. For some people, "here" might be increasing that emergency fund to 6 or even 12 months' expenses. Nothing wrong with that, but you know what you're doing now, so keep at it and revisit this article when you're happy with your emergency fund.

For others, "here" is about making your money work for you, which usually boils down to a question of which takes priority: saving/investing or paying down debt? The answer is, like so many other things, it depends on your personal predilections.

It's not uncommon to see some best-selling personal finance gurus advocating some kind of zero-debt strategy. Like, pay off all your debt (including your mortgage!) before saving any money, or buy a house with cash only, or never use a credit card and only use debit cards ... that kind of thing. That's a very conservative option that is guaranteed to keep you out of trouble and may be the best bet for some people. But we tend to disagree.

Debt is not in and of itself the devil, as some would have you believe. Debt can be good. Debt can be productive. Debt can absolutely get you in massive, massive trouble, too. But so can a lot of things. Fun fact: all the money that you have in your bank account is considered a debt to the bank that has it. They take those deposits and use them to make loans, and they get a higher rate of interest on their loans (assets) than they pay you for your deposits (debts). That's how banks make money.

That's also how the vast majority of companies in the world grow. They take on debt and (ideally) use the money to invest in productive assets that return more than the cost of the debt. There's no reason you can't do the same thing.

For example: Take out a home equity line of credit to remodel your kitchen before selling your house. That home equity line is debt, it charges you interest. But the expectation is that you will make more by improving your kitchen than you will pay in interest, so it makes sense. It's the same idea with your money more broadly.

Let's say you can get 8% returns by investing your money in the stock market. If you're paying 18% interest on a credit card balance, by all means pay off the credit card balance! But if you're paying 2% on a car loan, you're better off not paying off that debt more quickly and instead investing the extra money.

What about a mortgage at 4%? Well, that's where the personal preference comes in. From a strict numbers standpoint, 8% is greater than 4%, so you're net positive if you don't pay down the mortgage and instead invest the money. But stock market returns aren't guaranteed and that 4% is, and owning your house free and clear is definitely worth something ... but just how much is up to you and will vary person to person. Hence, it depends.

Nothing lasts forever and Life can change quickly.






I hope everyone had a great winter, because if you've spent any amount of time outside, you know that is over. The weather is getting warmer and I have seen several people on the beach in bathing suits already. We've been busy for the past several weeks at the police department. Between the Critz Run, getting ready for all the upcoming summer events, and a series of car break-ins where all the vehicles were left unlocked, we've had a lot going on.

To start off this summer season, I'm just going to focus on some of the fines that a person could get for not following beach rules. First and foremost, glass is not allowed anywhere on the beach in any form. Whether it's a beer bottle or a pickle jar, it's a \$367.00 citation. Secondly, with the exception of service animals, there are no pets allowed on the beach. The Americans with Disabilities Act says the only acceptable service animals are dogs and miniature horses. Also, the ADA does not cover emotional support animals, so they're also not allowed. And all service animals need to be on a leash at all times. Having a pet on the beach is a \$510.00 citation, and it's strictly enforced because of the natural wildlife on our beach, such as migratory birds and sea turtles. If you have an animal on the beach and it's not on a leash, you can receive two citations that total up to more than \$700.00. The last big issue that we encounter is littering. All trash needs to be put in a trash bag. Keeping a pile by your chair is still considered littering under our city ordinance. This fine is also \$510.00, so make sure you bring a trash bag with you when you go to the beach.

The last thing I'd like to do with this article is recognize four of our officers for completing a difficult block of training. Lt. Randolph, Spo. Griesbach, Ofc. Wright, and Ofc. Dickerson all completed Hostage Negotiation Level 1. This is a difficult scenario-based class hosted by the FBI. These officers are in the process of establishing continual training in this skill and creating a response team. Having officers with these skills greatly benefits our department and community because it helps to mitigate situations far beyond those involving hostages, such as people with mental health issues or someone wanting to harm themselves. We are fortunate that they were willing to undergo this training and hope to see their skills put to work soon.

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


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10 RULES FOR SURVIVING A TYBEE PARADE

Tybee Gals Take Over Ireland

A few months ago, while I was browsing through my monthly newsletter from the DC based Fagoweeks Ski Club, I saw a promotion for a trip to Ireland in January for under \$900. My family and I have been members of the Fagoweeks since I was a child, which has exposed me to world travel at a young age. A little history on the name... It represents a lost Indian Tribe where the chief stands at the top of a mountain and says, "Where the #\$*% are we?" It's more of a drinking club with a skiing problem, so ... you get the idea. I had an interesting childhood, probably one of the reasons Tybee has felt like home as soon as we moved here seven years ago. It didn't take long for me to round up some travel buddies. Carolyn Williams (always my partner in crime), my daughter Baylie, my brother, sister-in-law and my niece all agreed that a four day drinking pub tour in January was a fabulous idea. We started making our trip payments in October and once 2019 arrived, it was time to pack our bags. Since the group was traveling from DC, the Tybee gals had to make a little road trip to Virginia first.

Day 1

Our whole crew of 24 people flew overnight from Dulles to Dublin. Our trip leader, Lisa, had instructed everyone to take a sleep aid on the flight, as there would be no crying about jet lag and NO SLEEPING at the bars! We landed in Dublin at 5am and once we picked up our rental car we hit the ground running. We dropped our bags at Fleet Street Hotel in the famous Temple Bar area, which is in the heart of Dublin. After a nice traditional Irish breakfast (eggs, sausage, black and white pudding, baked beans and toast), we headed straight to the Jameson Distillery.

Admission was \$20 per person, which included a drink along the way and a triple shot tasting at the end, well worth the admission price. The tour was interactive and really interesting and we all highly recommend the tour.

Following the Jameson tour, many of our crew headed to the Guinness factory. However, Carolyn and I wanted more spontaneous pub experiences than planned tours. Now, if you know Carolyn, you will know that she knows no strangers! Her routine question to the locals was this, "You have just been given the rest of the day off work and you are not allowed to go home - where do you go?" This always pointed us in the right direction. Our goal in Dublin was to find the Huc A Poos of Dublin.

First pub stop was Dulaney's. This is where we learned that the Irish people are obsessed with discussing American politics. Next stop was

to the Clarence Hotel, owned by Bono and the rest of the U2 band. Then on to The Brazen Head, Ireland's oldest pub, founded in 1198. This is where we met a couple of American brothers that told us about Frank Ryan's Pub just down the street ... don't threaten us with a good time! We found the place just as the band was loading in their gear. However, we had just discovered that we had already spent all of our euros and the banks were now closed. Traveling with only American dollars and an American Express card, we learned to ask what currency was accepted before ordering. Carolyn inquired with the bartender and found out they did not accept anything we had on us. He just said, "I want you to have a good holiday," as he handed us two pints of Guinness. A quick survey of the room and we quickly realized that this place was 90% Huc A Poos and 10% Quarter Bar (the 10% being the bras hanging over the bar).

It did not take long for this place to feel like our home away from home. Then we actually spotted one of the license plates stuck on the wall was from Chatham County, GA. Twenty minutes later, the bartender/owner (which we referred to as the Eric Thomas of Dublin) handed us two more pints. BINGO! We indeed found the Huc A Poos of Dublin!! Day one ended in the wee hours of the morning of day 2, after hitting a few more pubs and Chinese food at 3am.

Day 2

The cars were packed up and pointed to Northern Ireland. Some of our fellow travelers took the route to see some castles, but we opted for the coastal views. Luckily, we had a brave volunteer in our car to be our sole driver. Carolyn and I decided to sleep in the car in between cities, since we obviously were not getting much sleep at night.

Our next stop was Belfast City. We stayed in the super modern swanky hotel, The Mouldron. Let me tell you, this place was classy!! We had a corner room on seventh floor with city views in two directions. Once again, we were located in the heart of the city, in walking distance of everything.

When renting a car, don't skip collision insurance.

If renting a car, make sure someone is willing to drive on the left side of the road. It can be really tricky.

Pick hotels that are in walking distance of the fun stuff and main attractions you want to see. You can do and see more without spending money on transportation and parking.

Double up on the caffeine ... experience everything you can and sleep when you get home.

Use your visa/mc debit and credit cards for purchases, as your bank will do the exchange for you and you won't be left with cash from another country or stuck without a way to pay. Leave your American Express at home. Most places don't accept it.

Don't leave without googly eyes. The laughter will carry on for weeks.

were amazing, with hand carved wooden doors and bars, and decorative metal ceiling tiles. It was like walking back in time!

These volcanic rock formations are found in other areas of the world, but the Giant's Causeway is the most famous place to experience them. Update From Tybee's Mayor

First off, I would like to thank everyone who responded to our appeal for support of local Coast Guard personnel who went without pay for several weeks as a result of the federal government shut down. The Tybee Marine Rescue Squadron initiated this appeal and the City jumped on board to assist. The response was overwhelming. Over \$28,000 in gift cards were delivered to the Coast Guard for distribution to all Coast Guard units in Chatham County. So much was raised that gift cards were provided to units in Glynn County as well. Many Coast Guard service members are young, and missing a few paychecks can have a real impact on their lives and their stress level. While this effort to provide them with some level of support didn't make up for the missed paychecks, it certainly didn't hurt. It also gave us a chance to show them how much their service is appreciated. Thanks to everyone who pitched in for this very worthy effort. It was yet another example of our little community coming together to help others.

The construction on the new Marine Science Center has begun at North Beach. While we will lose some parking spaces in the area where the Center is being constructed, we are adding spaces in other areas of the north beach parking lot and along Gullick. We are projecting a net increase of about 30 parking spaces. That was an important aspect of this project, as beach parking is an issue, especially on spring and summer weekends. The new Marine Science Center will require parking as well, so we had to make sure we found a way to add parking. Will it be enough parking? On weekends when the weather is good in the spring and summer, probably not. But the same was true of the south end, where the Martine Science Center is presently located.

This facility has been on the City's agenda since 2003 when Special Purpose Local Option Sales Tax (SPLOST) revenue was committed for a new Marine Science Center. The 2003 SPLOST money dedicated for this project has not been used for anything other than a new Marine Science Center. The citizens voted in favor of the 2003 SPLOST and it is finally coming to fruition. Kudos to Council members Wanda Doyle and Barry Brown for being tireless advocates for this project.

A few other things to note about this project:

- We are conducting a traffic study for the north end of the island to help develop plans to address higher traffic volumes. Some of the solutions proposed by the study may be implemented before the new Science Center opens and some will not be. But we are working towards a long term plan to make the area safer for pedestrians, bicyclists and cars, while reducing the impact on residents on the more heavily traveled streets (i.e. North Campbell and Meddin).
- The existing site of the Marine Science Center will, in all likelihood, be used to house public safety personnel for the busy south end. This includes space for the ocean rescue team who currently work out of an old trailer that sits just to the north of the current site of the Marine Science Center facility. There is a need for a public safety presence on the south end and we hope to utilize this space accordingly.
- Access to the northernmost dune crossover in the north beach parking


lot is closed for the time being. I have heard from many citizens about this issue, especially surfers who use this crossover frequently. We are working on a way to open it back up during construction so as to not inconvenience anyone. The crossover will be re-opened after construction.

Several years ago, we were forced to remove the showers at the beach due to restrictions on water usage mandated by the Georgia Environmental Protection Division (EPD). A few years ago, the City added showers at the north beach with water that came from a shallow well. Since shallow well water is not restricted by the EPD, we were able to get these installed without any permitting issues. Before the start of summer, we expect to build showers at three locations on the south end between 14th and 18th Streets. These will also be using water from shallow wells. The water is treated and safe for shower use. We hope to replicate these wells in other areas of the beach going forward. They don't have hot and cold water (cold water only) but they do give our residents and visitors a chance to wash off all that sand before going about their day.

Speaking of water, you may remember the state paid for a deep well to be dug on the north end at the site of the City's Public Works. This was to be our long term solution to our water withdrawal limits and provide long term access to fresh water. The well was dug about a mile deep, but when the casing was being installed it collapsed about a half mile down. It was deemed by the engineers involved in the project to be unfixable. The State has now filed suit against the contractor and engineering firms for failure to deliver a functioning well. We have communicated clearly to the State Attorney General that any settlement or judgement in the State's favor should result in a new well being dug on Tybee, as we do not have any other viable options for accessing water for the long term. We will continue to monitor this case closely to ensure that Tybee is the State's first priority in this matter.

Finally, this is an election year for Tybee. Three council seats and the mayor's seat are up for election. I have been asked by many people if I plan on running for re-election and after a lot of thought and consideration, have decided that I am going to run again. It has been one of the biggest honors of my life to serve this great community and I would be honored to be afforded the opportunity to continue to serve as Tybee's mayor. I will be formally announcing my campaign in the coming weeks.





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


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
