If you haven't had the opportunity to visit Fort Pulaski, take my advice & do it. It is one of the most historic landmarks in our area.

Even if you are not keen on history, there is no way you can walk the grounds of this fort without taking a walk back in time. I had an opportunity to meet with Joel Cadoff, Park Ranger, Public Information Officer, Historic Weapons Coordinator, and The Man at Fort Pulaski. He knows everything down to exact dates (I barely remember my birthday). Joel is very knowledgeable and an excellent storyteller.

I had a minute to grill Joel. This is what I found out: He has wanted to be a Park Ranger since he was 12 years old (he's not 12 now). He started in Boston Harbor, Ma., and has worked hard to be where he

is today. Joel has been at Fort Pulaski for six years and has plans to grow and expand the stories told at the Fort. The Man knows his history and his Fort.

Naturally, I also had to ask if he had seen any ghosties or had any 'interesting stories' to tell. No ghosties. I was disappointed by that, but one can't hide that fascination to hope.

Read on ...

Fort Pulaski is named in honor of Casimir Pulaski, a Polish soldier who fought under the command of George Washington in the Revolutionary War. He was a noted cavalryman and a military commander who played a large role in training American troops. He is considered by many as *The Father of American Cavalry*. Pulaski sustained a mortal wound during the "The Siege of Savannah" and died a few days later in 1779 (What a fitting tribute to one of our Revolutionary War heroes to have a fort named after him).

Fort Pulaski was built following the War of 1812 to protect the port of Savannah, which (as it still is today) was one of the most important ports in the United States. Ironically, Robert E. Lee, a young West Point graduate, was appointed to the Corps of Engineers and was one of the assistant engineers responsible for the dikes and drainage systems built around the fort. It took 18 years to build the fort using an estimated 25,000,000 bricks, and slaves were used for most of the construction.

After its construction in 1847 it wasn't utilized until The Civil War. State of Georgia troops seized control of it in 1861 due to the importance of protecting the port of Savannah. Not only was Savannah used for shipping out cotton but also for shipping in guns. Therefore it was considered vital to the Confederates to protect Savannah once Georgia seceded.

A young Colonel Charles Olmstead (26 years old) was put in





command of the fort in 1862. The garrison was formed of five companies with a total of 385 officers and men. At this time, Fort Pulaski was considered impregnable. Its walls were 11 feet thick! But unfortunately for the Confederates, Federal troops were able to penetrate the wall in about 30 hours using a new rifled cannon. Olmstead surrendered the fort to protect the lives of his men. With the fort back in Union hands, all shipping in and out of Savannah ceased. The loss of Savannah as a viable Confederate port helped cripple the Southern war effort.

An interesting piece of history here is that the real “hero” of this battle was Captain Quincy Adams Gilmore, who was put in charge of the siege preparations on Tybee Island, despite advice that “you might as well cannonade the Rocky Mountains.” Gilmore took a chance using this modern rifled cannon to breach the walls of the fort. This was a huge turning point in the Civil War because up until this point in history, stone fortifications were the primary defense against invaders. I love the fact that the United States Army changed the face of warfare that had lasted for 1,000 years!!

After the Civil War, Fort Pulaski was maintained by just a handful of people until it was declared a national monument in 1924 and was finally turned over to the National Park Service in 1933.

A staff of around 17 people, from park rangers, cultural and natural resource technicians, and volunteers, maintain the fort and grounds today. If you are interested in volunteering your time, doing anything from working in the visitor center, doing interpretive programs, helping maintain the grounds, or even re-enacting, your services would be gladly appreciated. What better thing to do to help keep history alive!

There are 1-2 daily guided tours daily as well as cannon firings every Saturday.

Upcoming Events at Fort Pulaski:

July 4 – Take a guided fort tour, play some baseball, or catch a cannon demonstration in celebration of Independence Day.

Labor Day weekend (Sept. 5-6) – Confederate Living History Weekend. Volunteers will actually garrison the fort. Fort Pulaski will come to life and will resemble what it would have looked like in 1861. There will be weapons and artillery demonstrations as well as soldier’s life demonstrations. Let these living historians bring us back in time.

Veteran’s Day weekend (Nov.7-8) – Union Living History Weekend. The members of the 48th New York Volunteers will be at the fort commemorating the service of our veterans from the Civil War to today. Join Fort Pulaski as the old fort comes alive once again.

Candle Lantern (Evening Dec.18-19) – The Savannah and Tybee Island holiday tradition continues. Join park staff and volunteers as they commemorate the Christmas Nog Party of 1861. There’s no cooler way to experience a Confederate Fort Pulaski than a nighttime tour by candle lanterns with music, refreshments, and an evening cannon firing.

Free Days:

August 25th – National Park Service Birthday 99 years old.

September 26 – National Park Lands Day

November 9 – Veterans Day

Fort Pulaski is open daily from 9-5 with a \$7.00 admission at the gate. You can enjoy Fort Pulaski all year long by purchasing an annual pass as well. And believe me, it is money well spent. So, if you haven’t been yet, please do. You will not regret it! Just walking onto the grounds is something every local and visitor must experience for themselves. And this fascinating piece of history is in our own backyard!!

SURFER GIRL

A common dilemma we experience on Tybee is *Congested Surf Energy*. If you know someone that is suffering from CSE, you know it is not pretty. It is a gripping tension that floods your body and can only be cleared by wave arrival. Surfers have experimented with ways to occupy themselves during these typical flat spells in the water and have even found alternative sports in its wake. Around the same time Jack Johnson started making banana pancakes, Austin Keen, Benji Sanders and their Tybee crew adopted skim



boarding into their lifestyle as a pastime. They found that their session count multiplied and their skill sets expanded. They took that miniature 5/8" thick board and ran. These boys exploded into the world of skim and have since expanded its boundaries with their energy and creativity.


Skimming has not quite hit the highway in the sport world. It is a fresh way to think of wave riding and it is constantly reinventing itself and its capabilities. Skim Boarding, if you haven't seen it in action, consists of charging a wave at a full on sprint down the beach, dropping your skimmer, pouncing onto it, and controlling the light, squirrely board underneath your feet. These pros have managed to take it so much further than that with some epic wave riding stunts. They turned skim into no joking matter and now they are here to share the stoke and potential of skimming to the ever capable and hungry next generation.

I was able to talk to Benji and get the low down on him and Austin starting a skim camp on Tybee. He voiced the stoke that he gets from skimming and shared that it definitely has the same hook power as other adrenaline pumping sports. Benji also expressed how beneficial it would have been if someone had shown him and his crew the ropes when they were just starting out. So these seasoned skimmers that have put in their time kneading out their skills are taking the reins and filling out that role of mentorship that they could have used for direction and progression. The kids are responding to it like sharks on chum.

The skim camp scene is set up on the beach, a morning affair from 8-11, and this month of July is hosting three weeks of it. It's an awesome sight to see a pod of kids sliding around, with a wide spectrum of skill sets, all testing the waters and their shreddabilities. It draws a pretty intrigued crowd that cannot help but join the support of a successful shot at this super technical form of wave riding. Each individual improving at their own pace with their provided skim boards. The bag of endless tricks come later and



these lucky kids have some of the best skimmers to reference. Austin Keen is a Tybee native that shared his talent of skimming with the world and has grown in popularity as an innovative shredder. Benji has been tearing it up skimming on Tybee just as long and the two feel the draw to keep that same stoke pulsing on their stomping grounds that keep them so tuned in as riders. Forming this camp is a way of spitting that small encouragement and practice that every kid could use in their day to day. A boost of skim confidence can go a very long way! Their camp philosophy is true through and through, it's all about enjoying the ride and spreading the stoke. Right on! An important lesson for us all. The direction it is going is yet to be found but the ease of these seasoned skimmers is a testament to their dedication. This extreme sport faces challenges unique to itself and will definitely have its time of serious recognition. Thanks to these passionate wave riders and willingness to share their knowledge with the next generation, skimming is starting to make its mark. 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July Fishing Forecast



INSHORE

Shrimp are moving into the creeks and the fish are responding. The Flounder, Speckled Sea Trout, and Redfish are all feeding. Tarpon will make an appearance as well. Live bait and artificial baits are both producing. This time of year there is nothing like being on your drop with the sun rising on a calm day, pitching a top water plug and watching the fish explode on your bait. My favorite top water plug has got to be the Bomber Badonk-A-Donk. I have caught every species listed above on this lure. Work it slow with a good twitch and the fish won't resist.

TYBEE PIER FISHING

Fishing has only gotten better and now that the warm waters are here the number of species has only increased. I have seen Mullet swimming in the surf and this time of year the schools of Menhaden will be here. Now warm waters and lots of bait equals lots of predators. So look for Jack Cervalle, Spanish Mackerel and for the lucky few, maybe even a Tarpon. For these species live bait near the schools of bait is a choice and always try to match the hatch. Speckled Sea Trout, Redfish, Black Drum, Whiting, Bluefish, and Pompano should all be around as well.

NEAR SHORE

There are a lot of options when it comes to the nearshore fishery. King Mackerel, Cobia, Spadefish, Spanish Mackerel,

Barracuda, Black Sea Bass, Triggerfish, Tarpon and Sharks are all fish that can be targeted on a daily basis. With the warmer waters some days you can even luck out and find a stray Mahi or Wahoo coming to the nearshore areas. Everything will be following the bait fish. Watch for the schools of Greenies and you can have a fishing bonanza. It won't take you long to find out if the fish are near. For those not wanting to travel far the Tarpon, Spanish Mackerel and Sharks will be all over the beaches of the barrier islands. Fish the schools of Menhaden or Mullet. For the Tarpon I like to fish three live baits, one on top freelined, one on the bottom and then one right in the middle. Tarpon can be real spooky and it's always best to be quiet when getting close to a school of them. Once hooked these fish go ballistic. They will put on an airshow like no other fish out there. This helps them escape so be prepared to lose a few.



OFF SHORE

Finding a temperature break, weed line, birds, flying fish or a current rip is going to be the way to success. The fish can be really scattered this time of year as they are all hungry and looking for a meal. If you are equipped to high speed troll it is a good way to cover ground and find fish at the same time. High speed trolling takes specialized gear so make sure you have everything before you head out and give it a try. The bottom fishing is fantastic this time of year. Grouper, Vermilion Snapper, Triggerfish, Amberjack, Black Sea Bass and many other porgies and grunts to keep you busy all day long. Every year we get a short window for Red Snapper so we all look forward to this time. Unfortunately I must inform you that this year the South Atlantic Fishery Management Council has declared, "There will not be commercial or recreational seasons in 2015 because the total number of Red Snapper removed from the population in 2014 exceeded the allowable level."

TAXITALES

Okay Tybee, Summer is here! This means the tourons are here, which we all love, but they now outnumber us. Now seems like a good time to go over some basics for calling a cab. We will call this "Taxi Cab Etiquette." Most of you locals already know the way to play the game. Let's help those who don't...

We will start with this... Time is everything! We will start with "Taxi Time." When we say 30 seconds, it means you called at the absolute right time. We are there. We are ready to pick you up. Tick, tick, tick, tick, tick... These people are how 10 minutes become much more than 10 minutes.

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
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BOOK REVIEW






Independence Day

The 40s were tumultuous times for America. At the beginning of the decade, Germany began an all-out march on Europe, and with the 1941 bombing of Pearl Harbor, the United States entered WWII. The strength and determination of the American fighting force and its homeland support eventually liberated Europe, and when Truman succeeded FDR as president, his decision to drop atomic bombs on Japan ended the war which had dragged on for four long painful years.

The universal reply was, **"Just watch for the water tower and you'll know we're almost there!"** What a thrill to ride on Daddy's strong shoulders in the foaming breakers, while Mama spread out the picnic on a blanket on the sand.

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Main Street Musings



Summertime is here and we hope you are enjoying the season!
 The next community event, *Movies in the Park*, will be July 18 featuring *Big Hero 6*, rated PG. The heart-warming animated film depicts the special bond that develops between a plus-sized inflatable robot named Baymax, and prodigy Hiro Hamada, who team up with a group of friends



to form a band of high-tech heroes. Grab your blankets and chairs, pack a picnic, invite your friends and family and come on out to watch a movie at Memorial Park! The movie will start just after sunset.

On June 30, several Development Authority/Main Street Directors attended Downtown Development Authority training during the GMA Conference at the Convention Center on Hutchison Island. Board members are required to attend training sessions annually as part of their commitment to the Program. A few participated in training earlier this year during the Annual Retreat. Directors will share highlights from what they learned at June's training in a future *Beachcomber* article.

In addition to exciting things that are happening with the Program, the City of Tybee Island has been designated as an accredited National Main Street Program again this year! This recognition confirms that the City is meeting the commercial district revitalization performance standards set by the National Main Street Center®, a subsidiary of the National Trust for Historic Preservation. Each year, accredited Main Street Programs throughout the nation are announced by the National Main Street Center and its partners in recognition of their exemplary commitment to historic preservation and community revitalization through the Main Street Four Point Approach®.

The City of Tybee's Main Street performance is annually evaluated by Georgia Department of Community Affairs-Office of Downtown Development, which works in partnership with the National Main Street Center. The standards set are benchmarks for measuring each individual Main Street program's application of the Main Street Four Point Approach®. Evaluation criteria determines the communities that are building comprehensive and sustainable revitalization efforts and include standards such as fostering strong public-private partnerships, securing an operating budget, tracking programmatic progress and actively preserving historic buildings.


During 2014, in collaboration with the City, the Development Authority/ Main Street Program's Executive Director and volunteer Board of Directors strengthened their partnerships with local organizations, residents, and merchants in preserving the community, commerce and culture of Tybee. A few notable examples are as such: providing a façade improvement grant for commercial properties, becoming a Certified Local Government, hosting additional community events such as *Movies in the Park*, supporting new and expanding businesses which led to over 37 additional full time jobs, hosting Merchant Meet-Ups, assisting over 30 organizations hosting events which had a total economic impact of over \$3 million, and increased community pride that spurred \$3.1 million in private/public investments with building rehab/renovation projects. Mayor Buellerman states "The City of Tybee Island is honored to be recognized as an accredited Main Street community once again this year. Since we activated the (Downtown) Development Authority to function jointly with the Main Street Program, the boundaries expanded to within city limits. This enabled us to provide more opportunities for quality revitalization and redevelopment for our residents, merchants, and visitors. This step, and the foundation we've built with the program since 2010, continues to create an even better city for living, working and playing year-round. The balanced approach for long-term success is at the core of this economic development, historic preservation model. This is what the program is proving for our community, especially with partnerships being strengthened. Each program throughout the nation is recognized for their unique local efforts and I am proud that our city is setting an example on Georgia's coast."

Preservation efforts on Tybee, which is at the base of the Program's foundation, continue to be supported and encouraged. The Historic Preservation Economic Impact Study, *Beyond Tourism*, which the City of Tybee Island helped underwrite, shows that preservation efforts truly do have a positive impact for the businesses, citizens, and visitors to our island. During the American Revolution, the legal separation of the Thirteen Colonies from Great Britain occurred on July 2, 1776, when the Second Continental Congress voted to approve a resolution that had been proposed in June by Richard Henry Lee of Virginia declaring the United States independent from Great Britain. After voting for independence, Congress turned its attention to the Declaration of Independence, a statement explaining this decision, which had been prepared by a Committee of Five, with Thomas Jefferson as its principal author. Congress debated and revised the wording of the Declaration, finally approving it on July 4.

A day earlier, John Adams had written to his wife Abigail: *“The second day of July, 1776, will be the most memorable epoch in the*

history of America. I am apt to believe that it will be celebrated by succeeding generations as the great anniversary festival. It ought to be commemorated as the day of deliverance, by solemn acts of devotion to God Almighty. It ought to be solemnized with pomp and parade, with shows, games, sports, guns, bells, bonfires, and illuminations, from one end of this continent to the other, from this time forward forever more.”

Adams’s prediction was off by two days. From the outset, Americans celebrated independence on July 4, the date shown on the much-publicized Declaration of Independence, rather than on July 2, the date the resolution of independence was approved in a closed session of Congress.

Historians have long disputed whether Congress actually signed the Declaration of Independence on July 4, even though Thomas Jefferson, John Adams, and Benjamin Franklin all later wrote that they had signed it on that day. Most historians have concluded that the Declaration was signed nearly a month after its adoption, on August 2, 1776, and not on July 4 as is commonly believed

With summer in full swing,

Alaina, Margie and I were hitting the pavement to re-up the island with more magazines and found ourselves in need of fuel for our task. Hmm...what are we in the mood for, nothing too heavy, don't want pizza, not really feeling the fried fare...something light, maybe seafood...Ahh, let's go to Social.

Tybee Island Social Club, located at 1311 Butler Ave. (near 14th St.), has been serving its unique, fresh, made from scratch menu to Tybee locals and visitors since 2010. Their eclectic menu ranges from house made hummus and ceviche, to crab cakes and shrimp and grits, the social burger and unique tacos. What I really love is that their healthy, fresh menu can be interchanged and the combinations are endless. For example the Biggie Smalls



Burrito has a choice of five different meat proteins and can be served as a burrito, rice bowl or salad. Love me some choices. You really could eat there every day for weeks on end and not eat the same thing twice. That's not even counting specials or their

Brunch menu on Sundays.

On this particular day we splurged on Crab and Shrimp Nachos, the Biggie Smalls Burrito with Tuna, Steak Tacos and the Superman Pita. I could have stopped at the Crab and Shrimp Nachos, crab, shrimp, queso, Manchego cheese, roasted corn salsa, black beans, roasted garlic jalapeno lime crema and cilantro. So good, and plenty for sharing, the shrimp and crab mixed with the cheeses made for a decadent treat, super filling, a meal in itself really.



Next came our main dishes, everything looked awesome. That Biggie Smalls Burrito is no joke, stuffed with rice, seared tuna, pepper jack, black beans, roasted corn salsa, chipotle aioli, cilantro and a side of jalapeno-lime crema that I could not get enough of. There was no way I was finishing this beast, huge. The tuna was cooked perfect and the flavors blended superbly. That jalapeno-lime crema really made it for me.

Even though I was stuffed I still had to sample the other dishes. The Steak Tacos were delish, seared steak, radish pico, queso fresco, garlic aioli and cilantro on an open-faced corn tortilla. The



steak cooked just right and more than enough to satisfy. The Superman Pita was killer too, a warm pita stuffed with fried chicken, chipotle aioli, organic greens, red onion and cilantro. Certainly worthy of its name. We washed it all down with 2 for 1 Sangrias, house made with three varieties to choose from, offered weekdays til 6pm.

Social also offers a full bar and specialty drink menu as well as daily dessert

specials. The fun doesn't stop after your meal; Social has an array of entertainment including Open Mic, Wine Tastings and some of the area's best Live Music on the weekends. Their super popular Bluegrass Brunch is served up every Sunday from 11am to 3pm, with live Bluegrass music. A great way to get back in the game after a long Saturday Night out on the town.

Thanks again Tybee Island Social Club, the food was delicious, service was friendly and the atmosphere was relaxing and cozy as always.

IN FOR A PENNY

Considering the deep Irish heritage associated with Savannah, you might naturally think there would be a surplus of Irish influenced bands in the area, but that doesn't necessarily ring true. Some things are formed out of necessity or circumstance, or even just pure desire. Tybee local band *In for a Penny* was born out of a bit of each. There's no guarantees in the world of creating art and sometimes you need to step away from something you love because the inspiration isn't there anymore. It can just happen, life takes over, situations change. But change is good.

Having taken nearly a decade break from music Sean McNally came across a gift he had been given 25 years ago by his wife's grandfather. A mandolin. Having been a guitar player since he was about 10 years old, he made a vow, "I'm gonna learn how to play this thing." After messing around a bit and hitting up the web for some basics, he was ready to debut his new found interest.

The Sand Bar on Tybee had been gaining momentum as a live music venue over the past year or so and they offered an open mic night. The tight quarters in the main bar area might not seem like the ideal space for live music, you are kind of right on top of the musicians while they play, but this platform seems to be working for them. McNally debuted during an open mic session and it was evident immediately that the crowd desired more. This led to the birth of "Monday Mandolin Mayhem" at The Sand Bar. Due to the

crowds response he quickly became a fixture on Mondays as well as Wednesdays for open mic. During an open mic session a request was made for a Dropkick Murphy's cover and given the response from the horde, forming a band was inevitable. St. Patrick's Day was rapidly approaching and that gave McNally a goal for putting together the band.

Dawon "Henny DaButcha" Henderson had been sitting in on percussion with McNally regularly, as his breaks from working at the bar would allow, and was a natural fit. Next, a shout out for a guitar player on the Savannah Musicians Facebook page resulted in a contact from Savannah local Jeremy Riddle, who ironically had already been performing at the same venue as a solo act for a while. The trio got together and this Irish Folk Punk band *In for a Penny* was formed.

Influenced by House of Pain, The Rumjacks, Flogging Molly's as well as Dropkick Murphy's, to name a few, this not your typical Irish Band. "We are by no means a traditional Irish band, nor are we trying to be," says McNally. "But you'll leave feeling Irish," adds Riddle. Whether it's your particular cup of tea or not, the entertainment factor is there. "We have a natural chemistry, it's all about fun," says Henderson.

Considering the band has only been together for a few months, they have logged a half dozen originals including "Guardian Angel" penned by McNally and quickly becoming a crowd favorite. Most of their practice time is gained playing gigs and this has brought them as far as Jacksonville, as well as several venues in Savannah and Tybee, including The Sand Bar and Huc A Poos. "We have more fun than anyone in the room," says Riddle. "We want to bring good music to Tybee," adds Henderson.

Looking ahead, the band is concentrating on a regular rotation at local venues and gaining a local following, as well as producing a video and an EP. The band brings their rowdy mayhem July 30 to North Beach Grill on Tybee and July 31 to The Warehouse in Savannah.

"I'm really proud of how well we all mesh," says McNally, "We are more like a family. We want to be that band that people want to come and see."

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From the RIVER'S END...

Year-Round Workamping: The World at Our Doorstep

Did you know that River's End, the campground on the north end of the island, is the only municipally-owned & commercially-operated campground in the state of Georgia? This claim to fame is unique, but presents a conundrum in the limited exposure to other professionals within the outdoor hospitality industry to compare best practices, etc. This means that we have to be diligent in the allocation of our resources and in exchanging information with other public and private parks. A rising sea raises all ships is good news- unless you are a polar bear. We don't want to become a metaphorical 'polar bear' so it's very important for us to establish a network to monitor RV industry amenity offerings, camping innovations, and outdoor-hospitality industry trends. If we had to do this alone, extensive travel would be required, costs would be exorbitant, time-consuming, and it would take us away from the immediate needs of the park. One of our greatest and most important resources in the efficient operation of the campground is our year-round, onsite, volunteer *Workamper* program!

This program benefits the volunteer by offering a full-service campsite (water, electricity, sewer) that includes cable access, WiFi connectivity, and propane at cost in order for up to 30 hours of volunteer service per week/site. This program is advertised online to recruit year-round campers (known as full-timers) who serve as volunteers in various campground operation capacities as a means of travel. Each volunteer owns their RV and has an opportunity to serve fellow campers and share information among the various parks where they serve. There is quite a bit to learn at River's End because we are progressive with our use of technology, including our web presence, real-time updating of reservations, arrivals and departures, online reservations, and after-hour check-ins, including a pay kiosk for late night check-ins, keyless entry systems for cabin access, and a higher level of service than most other parks, such as the escorting of each camper to their site. There is also plenty of time allotted for our staff to experience what Tybee, Savannah, and the area offer so we ask that every volunteer commit to a minimum of three months of service to alleviate the extensive training throughout the year. Most of our workampers serve up to six months, although some return for multiple seasons.


The campground also benefits in the lessening of the fiscal impact of staffing costs associated with a 6am – 10pm daily operation and allows our local employees to better understand our customer expectations in order to define our service levels and administer our standards of care. This program allows us to gain insight about the

needs of our campers by fellow campers in order to avoid 'reinventing the wheel' and optimizing resources efficiently to optimize the guest experience.

If you are considering becoming a workamper, and you have your own RV, let me tell you about the three most common 'deal breakers' that define if your experience will be a positive one. The first requirement, make sure you really enjoy people. If the overwhelming irony that we provide our livelihood by ensuring that visitors to our island have a great vacation doesn't put a smile on your face- then this isn't for you. The second is the answer to the question that I'm asked most – 'Do I have to clean toilets'? The answer is always 'Yes, with a smile on your face, and a song in your heart!' Finally, if you can complete the first two proficiently, and repeat them successfully, day after day- your performance will be fine. However, this is a lifestyle and if the yearning for a life separate from where you work and what you do for a living is important to you, this probably isn't for you, either. I don't want to deter anyone, just convey the expectations. . . Spending every moment of your time in an RV allows you to really get to know the person, or folks, with whom you are traveling. You'll find out everything you've ever wanted to know about them- and then some more...!




