



Coco's Sunset Grille

Quit monkeying around, it's time to get down to business! This month's Food Spy was none other than **Coco's Sunset Grille**. This brightly colored building with an incredible roof top deck sits on Tybee's own Lazaretto Creek next to Captain Mike's Dolphin Adventures. If you came across the bridge, you saw it. Coco's tag line is "where FUN is the best thing to have!" But I can also tell you the food is spectacular as well (trust me, I eat here at least four times a week). For this trip I was joined by the always ballsy Wen McNally, everyone's favorite Jeremy Riddle, and the only person who notices when I miss my deadline, our very own Alaina Loughridge. Let's dig in!

Right off the bat I knew it was going to be a great evening. Manager and former Bartender of the Month, Rodney, had set us up a great table in the bar area. We were up against a wall of windows, overlooking the creek. You know the seafood is fresh when you watch the shrimp boats pull up to the dock, as the dolphins jump for the by catch. Our server, Kellie, came out right away with a **Mexican Cheese Bowl**, an edible tortilla bowl full of queso dip made in-house. This was near buried under a mountain of fresh made tortilla chips. The queso was cheesy, creamy, and perfect! We knew there was a lot of food coming, so we skipped the optional salsa and sour cream (not that you should!).

Coco's has the best **Beer Battered Calamari**, I don't care who I offend. It was thinly battered and fried to perfection. Served with a mildly spiced chipotle aioli, made in-house of course. Alaina and I tore this up before Wen was finished taking the photos of the next dish. Speaking of the next dish, we were blessed with one of my favorite appetizers on Coco's menu. The **Tuna Bites**. Wild caught Atlantic Tuna, gently tossed in blackening seasoning, before a quick sear on the flat top. We ordered ours medium rare, take my word for it, it never needs to be cooked longer. This beautiful Tuna was drizzled in a sweet Thai chili sauce and is one

of my absolute go-to menu items (be sure to check out their Thai Tuna entree - masterpiece)!

Bartender Chrissy, who regularly refuses to be featured, brought us out the **Tybee Tea**, sweet tea vodka and lemonade. You can't taste the alcohol but I promise you it's there. This drink will sneak up on you fast. If you're looking for something a little fruiter, get yourself a **Parrot Head**. I can't give away the recipe, but it's a whole lotta rum, and a bunch of fruit juices. This is my go-to cocktail at Coco's. It totally fits the vibe!


On to our entrees... Next out from the kitchen the **Tybee Salad**, uniformly sliced sirloin atop a bed of mixed greens, shredded carrots, cucumbers, and tomatoes. The steak was drizzled in that Thai chili sauce everyone loves, and topped with fried onions. Served with a spicy house ranch dressing on the side, this plate was a crowd pleaser. It's no wonder at this point Chelsea (from all those other Food Spys) appeared out of nowhere and grabbed a plate. What can I say, she has great taste!

The next two I had been dreaming about for days, so it was vital we ordered them to tell you how great they are. **Shrimp Cake Sandwich**, not a crab cake, Tybee is a shrimp town. This patty had no filler, it was shrimp, and shrimp, and shrimp. On a toasted bun, and some more of that chipotle aioli. This sandwich was packed with flavor! We paired this with the **Scofflaw Basement IPA**. Your mother called, she said you need to do the same.

Real talk - **Bourbon Glazed Salmon**. Thick, beautifully cooked salmon, on a plate of skin-on mashed potatoes and firm green beans covered in a house bourbon glaze. This is a lick the plate clean item! I've never lied to you. Trust me. Order this. Paired with a glass of **Art of the Earth Pinot Grigio**. Your taste buds will thank you.

We couldn't leave without trying Coco's homemade **Key Lime Pie**. Made fresh almost daily, and before you discredit me for saying that, know they almost sell out every night! A flaky graham cracker crust and tart key lime, this is a perfect end to a great meal! Except it isn't, there was no chance we were going to leave without trying their world famous (featured on multiple television shows) **Deep Fried Strawberries**. Fresh berries, dipped in a sweet batter, and fried, I can't give it all away, just do yourself a favor and go order some!

Coco's Sunset Grille is located at 1 Old US Highway 80 East. Turn at the Welcome to Tybee sign. Open daily from 11am to 9pm, Coco's offers fresh local seafood, daily lunch and dinner specials, daily cocktail specials, and happy hour Monday - Friday 4:15-6:15.







The Screened Pavilion at Memorial Park

School is officially out and summer is here! That means more time to host gatherings of friends and family for celebrations. With graduations, holidays, weddings, family reunions, and cook-outs, to name a few, there are many reasons to celebrate all summer long. But living on a small island many of us make the sacrifice of square feet to live by the beach. Where will everyone park? Will everyone I want to invite fit in my house, let alone porch? How will the kiddos stay entertained? Don't let these concerns stop you from your celebrations, the City has a facility for you.

Of the handful of City facilities available for rental, the **Screened Pavilion at Memorial Park** is perfect for summer festivities. Large enough to hold 300 people, there is plenty of room for activities. The surrounding Memorial Park offers restrooms, a playground, tennis courts, volleyball courts, a basketball court and a large field with room for even more activities. Inside the Screened Pavilion there are 20 picnic tables, ceiling fans, overhead lights, and electrical outlets. Directly outside the back door across from the double door entryway are two large grills and water faucet access. The Screened Pavilion remains locked and is only accessible by a key when reserved, which gives the option to come and go as you please during the hours of the reservation time. So feel free to enjoy the amenities of the surrounding park, cross the street and go to the beach, or go for a ride on the bike route that runs right beside the pavilion.

Luckily for those that live within the City of Tybee Island there is no rate fee for residents to reserve the Screened Pavilion. The only financial requirement is the \$100 damage/cleaning deposit, which is returned after the reservation, as long as there is no damage and everything has been cleaned up. All that is required to reserve any facility is the completed facility reservation application and damage/cleaning deposit payment. Too tired to ride your bike all the way to City Hall to complete the application? Let us make it even easier for you! The Facility Reservation Application is available on the City's website www.cityoftybee.org by selecting 'How Do I...' in the top menu bar on the homepage and then clicking the second to last option 'Make a Facility Reservation' in the first column under 'Apply For.' There is an area for payment information at the bottom of the application and you are able to submit via email or fax.

And when summertime is gone and the living is not so easy, birthdays, anniversaries, celebrations of life, picnics and baby showers still must go on. The Screened Pavilion and other City facilities are available for reservations year round. And let's face it, if you live on Tybee chances are you enjoy celebrating things all year long. Even for those that cross the bridges from surrounding areas to enjoy some Tybee time, non-residents are also able to reserve the City's facilities at either a daily or hourly rate fee. 




The ambulance looked at her and immediately loaded her up to take her to the hospital.



Beach Walks with Dr. Joe

PYCNOGONIDS: SEA SPIDERS!!

One of the things I've noticed over the years of studying coastal animals and seaweeds along the southeastern US is that the abundance of different species changes from year to year. All the different species are generally present during their particular seasons, but one year one species will be here in greater numbers than usual; and the next year something else will be overly abundant. Folks that come and visit Tybee Island every year at about the same time have told me that they have noticed the same thing. One year a particular kind of animal will be real common, and the next year something else will be abundant. Reproductive success, slight variations in environmental conditions during larval stages, food abundance or scarcity, predator abundance, and even recent weather and oceanographic conditions are just a few of the factors that might ultimately affect how abundant something is around here each year.

One of the strangest, and to me most interesting, animals that seems to be here some summers but not so common other summers are Pycnogonids. They are often called Sea Spiders because they look more like a spider than anything. Although they are classified as Arachnids, along with real spiders, scorpions and Horseshoe Crabs, Pycnogonids are in a group all to themselves within the Arachnids and are not spiders at all. They are probably more closely related to Horseshoe Crabs than spiders. I don't like spiders! But I don't mind these mild-mannered, fragile little "Sea Spiders."

There's really not much to a Pycnogonid. It appears to be just 8 (usually) skinny, jointed legs that come together in one spot. There doesn't look like there is hardly any main body or head, because these body parts are very reduced. They live down in the water totally submerged, so they are true marine animals. I usually find them on hard bottom areas like rocks, dock pilings or the sides of floating docks, where they slowly crawl around among seaweeds and hairy-looking hydroids and bryozoans. Because they are small, slow, and nothing but a bunch of skinny legs,



I usually overlook them, and it is usually someone else in our beach ecology trip who finds them in the tide pools along the jetty rocks.

It amazes me that something this small, fragile, and brittle-looking could survive submerged among the rock jetties where the waves are crashing and the water is moving swiftly throughout the crevices between rocks. But somehow they are able to maintain themselves. When we've had them in touch tanks on the beach, I've noticed they have the ability to fold up their legs and make their body much smaller and compact. I wonder if they find a small space between rocks, curl up and hold on when the water is moving fast and violently around them. But in the quiet, still water of a tide pool, these gentle, fragile little "Sea Spiders" slowly dance their way among the seaweeds and hydroids and usually go unnoticed by us tide pool explorers.

July Fishing Forecast

PIER FISHING

Fishing has only gotten better and now that the warm waters are here the number of species has only increased. I have seen Mullet swimming in the surf and this time of year the schools of Menhaden will be here. So look for Jack Crevalle, Spanish Mackerel and for the lucky few, maybe even a Tarpon. For these species, live bait near the schools of bait is the best chance at hooking a large fish and always try to match your bait to the bait you are seeing around. Speckled Sea Trout, Redfish, Black Drum, Whiting, Bluefish, Pompano should all be around as well.

INSHORE

Shrimp are starting to move into the creeks and the fish are responding. The Flounder, Speckled Sea Trout, and Redfish are all feeding. Tarpon will make a rare appearance as well. Live bait and artificial baits are both producing. This time of year there is nothing like being on your drop with the sun rising on a calm day, pitching a top water plug and watching the fish explode on your bait. This is the best time of year for Flounder, as they have been eating Mud Minnows. I fish a popping cork with a leader just long enough that my bait won't tangle up in the oysters and other structure. Always keep an eye out for a stray Tripletail that are around as well.

NEAR SHORE

There are a lot of options when it comes to the nearshore fishery. King Mackerel, Cobia, Spadefish, Spanish Mackerel, Barracuda, Black Sea Bass, Triggerfish, Tarpon and Sharks are all fish that can be targeted on a daily basis. With the warmer waters somedays you can even luck out and find a stray Mahi or Wahoo coming to the nearshore areas. Everything will be following the bait fish. Watch for the schools of Greenies and you can have a fishing bonanza. It won't take you long to find out if the fish are near. For those not wanting to travel far, the Tarpon, Spanish Mackerel and Sharks will be all over the beaches of the barrier islands. Fish the schools of Menhaden or Mullet. For the Tarpon I like to fish three live baits, one on top free lined, one on the bottom and then one right in the middle. Tarpon can be real spooky and it's always best to be quiet when getting close to a school of them. Once hooked these fish go ballistic. They will put on an airshow like no other fish out there. This helps them escape so be prepared to lose a few.

UPCOMING EVENT

Wanted to give a heads up to the local fisherman about the **5th Annual Barracuda Classic** coming up August 3rd 2019. I personally have tried to fish this tournament every year. All proceeds of the tournament go to local Charities. In the past they have helped Tybee Marine Science Center, Oatland Wildlife Center, and getting Autistic kids out on the water, to name a few. This tournament is held at Savannah Bend Marina and is put on by Tybee resident Aaron Groves. For those looking for more info go to www.facebook/barracudaclassic/. Rogue Waves

Bonds. James Bonds.

Bonds, unfortunately, are nowhere near as exciting as the actual 007. Or at least, they're not supposed to be. Maybe a Roger Moore 007 though, those were all pretty boring. A bond is an IOU - a promise to give your money back in the future with periodic fixed interest payments in the meantime. They used to be issued as actual certificates, with little coupons that you would clip off every six months and turn in to receive your interest payment, but alas, those days are gone.

So, if you get your money back (let's call that amount "100") at some point in the future and in the meantime are collecting interest payments, how much is that bond worth? 100? 102? 96? It's the same basic question as the time value of money from last month. Bond valuation is based on two things: 1) the interest rate of the bond relative to the current interest rate in the market, and 2) the quality of the company issuing the bond. So going back to last month's three-step valuation methodology:


Step 1 - Objectively: Earlier this year, 10-year US Treasury bonds had an interest rate of 2.5%. That rate is fixed for the life of the bond (hence "fixed income"). Right now, the interest rate is about 2.1%. That makes the bond issued at the start of the year more valuable, because it's paying 2.5% instead of 2.1%, so it will be priced higher than 100 (more like 103 or 104). If interest rates had instead gone up, then the value of the 2.5% bond would have gone down.

Step 2 - Subjectively: In last month's example, the future payout was guaranteed. In the bond world, repayment is not guaranteed because the company might default (go bankrupt), so you must adjust valuations based on potential default risk. If you have a 10-year US Government bond yielding 2.25% that is priced at 100, you would probably have a 10-year General Motors bond yielding 2.25% that is priced around 85, since GM has a greater risk of bankruptcy than the US Government (in actuality, it's more likely that you would see the GM bond priced closer to 100 but yielding more like 5% in that case, because nobody in their right mind would buy a GM bond that only yielded 2.25%).

Step 3 - Clark Gable: Or would they? Because interest rates have been kept at or near zero for the last decade, the bond market is now much more Pierce Brosnan 007 than Roger Moore (filled with action and absurdity).

For example, Argentina issued \$2.75 billion of 100-year bonds at 7.125%. Please note that Argentina has defaulted on its debt roughly once every 25 years for the last two centuries. Also, you will not be alive when that debt matures, so you effectively never get your money back, default or no default. Further, there is currently \$10 trillion (with a "t") in debt globally that has a negative interest rate. That's right, you don't get any interest payments; instead, you actually *have to pay interest yourself* to own the bond. Absurdity.

Some piles are good. Piles of sand, for example, create dunes that help protect the island from the next storm. Piles of debt do the opposite and make the economy more vulnerable to the next storm. And apart from that pile of negative yielding debt, we're also sitting on the biggest pile of corporate debt history. If all that sounds a bit frothy, well, what can we say? We like our bubbles shaken, not stirred.


Breathe In Breathe Out

The question for this month is "Can I get a DUI for operating a bicycle while under the influence?"

The answer is unequivocally yes. Bicyclists are bound by the same uniform rules of the road that applies to any operator of a vehicle. I am sure that will come as a huge surprise to those of you who seem to think that stop signs actually read stop (unless you are on a bicycle). The bicycle friendly atmosphere of Tybee, along with a number of controlled and uncontrolled intersections, makes it indeed surprising there haven't already been numerous automobile/bicycle collisions. That is probably due to the fact that most automobile drivers know that bicyclists tend to run stop signs and therefore slow down to a complete stop at every intersection even if they have the right of way.

Even though the answer to the question about operating a bicycle while intoxicated is abundantly clear, realistically it is doubtful you would get such a citation unless you are clearly in the wrong and involved in an accident causing property damage or personal injury. The record simply shows the charge which is driving under the influence and the disposition. It does not contain factual information concerning the underlying charge. You have a DUI and all of the factual, legal, and financial considerations that go with it.

Staying Hydrated

I bet you've heard it said that you need to drink at least eight glasses of water a day in order to stay properly hydrated. Perhaps you've also read that by the time you feel thirsty, you're already in an advanced state of dehydration, or that most of us are chronically dehydrated. I am going to share a few simple ways to ensure you stay hydrated and avoid those terrible headaches that can come with dehydration. Living on an island that is a vacation hot spot, we see dehydration often. Chances are also good that you've experienced a terrible hangover from dehydration. The symptoms of a hangover are caused from the dilation of blood vessels leading to too much blood flow to the head, which in turn causes the throbbing headaches associated with drinking. WebMD recommends that you divide your weight by 2, to figure your recommended ounces of water you should have each day.

This month I will cover a few remedies to help prevent dehydration and hangovers. Us locals blessed to be living in a beach town, our vacationers, beachgoers, and boaters, ALL could use a little of this advice.

Coconut water is the fluid that's found in the cavity of the coconut when you crack it open. It contains no fat and is very low in calories, about 50 calories for one cup, most of them from natural sugars. In addition to water and sugar, coconut water also contains some minerals such as potassium and magnesium. In fact, coconut water has more potassium than a banana!

As far as I can tell, a lot of the health claims made for coconut water are based on its potassium content. And potassium is certainly a good thing. It is involved in all kinds of essential bodily functions—and I suppose you could parlay that into a list of benefits like the one above. But virtually all fruits and vegetables are good sources of potassium. When you think about it, that list of benefits would apply to any diet that's high in fruits and vegetables.

Basically, coconut water is like natural Gatorade. Like Gatorade, it contains water, simple carbohydrates (or sugar), and electrolytes (or minerals). Compared to a sports drink made with refined sugars, artificial flavoring, and blue food coloring (yuck!), I'd say coconut water represents a solid upgrade. However, the benefits of sports drinks—whether natural or artificial—tend to be somewhat oversold.

Coconut Water can prevent dehydration and promote heart health. Consuming foods or beverages rich in potassium, including coconut water, may help reduce the risk of hypertension and stroke. Not only that but it promotes kidney health and fights aging. Coconut water contains compounds that seem to protect cells against aging and cancer—in test tubes anyway. It's exciting to think that drinking coconut water could make us immune to aging and disease. But we really should know better by now. I think it's naïve to think that coconut water is the elixir we've all been waiting for. At the end of the day, coconut water is a reasonably nutritious, natural beverage. A much healthier choice than Gatorade.

Have you ever woken up in the morning feeling (and looking) rough? There are several reasons for this but one of the biggest culprits is, simply: when you've gone all night without drinking H2O, your body will be dehydrated and that will result in your skin appearing thinner (due to a lack of fluid retention), your head will be hurting and bags forming under your eyes. In fact, dehydration is even what causes morning breath - which itself is a result of not producing saliva during the night. Saliva is a natural disinfectant and is responsible for killing off the bacteria in our mouths that make us smelly!

My personal favorite hydrator is Chia Seeds with a lemon and some water. I know it's impossible to say the word Chia without stutter-singing the Chia Pet jingle and envisioning a terra cotta pig, porcupine, or a Homer Simpson head sprouting tiny green leaves. But after you get past the cha cha cha Chia song, make a glass and reap the many benefits of Chia seeds.

Drinking a Chia drink just before bed will help you sleep better and wake up feeling hydrated. Again, Chia seeds provide a useful way to stay hydrated, especially if you're planning a fun beach day under the sun.

Chia seeds are very small seeds that come from the mint family. While they look fairly innocuous and uninteresting, they are rapidly becoming more popular owing to a large number of different health benefits. For one, Chia seeds are high in fiber and omega 3 fatty acids, and at the same time they have an almost magical ability to absorb fluid and hold onto it.

Chia seeds have quickly become popular and new research seems to suggest that these seeds might be very useful when it comes to improving our running speed, distance and performance. The reason has to do with their ability to absorb water. Impressively, Chia seeds can absorb up to 12 times their weight in water and then store it in the gut, allowing you to slowly absorb that fluid. This makes them fantastic for hydrating and means that you can get a steady supply of fluids when you need them during beach days and exercise.

Here's a few facts on Chia seeds:

- Chia seeds are rich in Omega-3 fatty acids, even more so than flax seeds.
- Chia seeds do not need to be ground to be absorbed by the body (unlike flax seeds but we'll save that for another article) and they can be stored for long periods of time without going rancid.
- They help with hydration due to their ability to absorb up to 9-10 times their weight in water.
- Chia seeds also contain fiber, protein, calcium, magnesium, copper, iron, and zinc, among many other nutrients.
- Chia seeds like to get stuck in your teeth. You were warned. Carry a flosser, I do.

Enjoy this delicious recipe, especially during beach days and before bed for a hydrated day!

Chia Fresca (Yield: 2 cups)

Ingredients:

2 cups water or coconut water

1.5 tbsp. Chia seeds

1/2 tbsp. fresh lemon or lime juice, or to taste

Sweetener, to taste (I like 1/2 tbsp. maple syrup, honey, or agave)

So get yourself hydrated and enjoy your summer on this beautiful island!

Talking Trash on Tybee

Living on Tybee is a blessing and for those of us lucky enough to live here, we treasure our little piece of happy paradise with a fierce pride. However, one of the fallbacks of living here is our influx of visitors that, during the summer, can be truly overwhelming at times. Lots of visitors come here to enjoy what we call home, and with that comes humanity and a never-ending ability to pick up one's trash and leave nothing but one's footprints. Everyone

is to blame for this... whether you drop your cigarette butt in the sand, leave a dirty diaper on the sidewalk and/or watch any of it happening without speaking up. Fortunately for Tybee, we have **Tybee Clean Beach** and these people refuse to take this trash lying down and are front and center to help educate and promote anti-litter and to grab their sticks and buckets and get out there to do something about it.

I had an opportunity to sit down with **Tim Arnold**, the mastermind behind Tybee Clean Beach, and get the trash talk about Tybee. But first, I participated in my first beach sweep on a June Sunday afternoon. I am ashamed to admit that I have never taken my time to do this before, so armed with my own pick-up stick and bucket, I set out with Mac McLellan and a determination to do my part. Twenty minutes later I realized I shouldn't be holding that stick and bucket because I wanted to start swinging! I know... but once you get out there and pick up dirty diapers, glass bottles, a million and four cigarette butts, and an astonishing variety of just yuck, you start to get mad. What saved me from running screaming were the all the other volunteers that were there. From Mom, Dad and the kids, to a Vietnam Vet, beach bums, surfers, and random tourists, they were all a variety of random humanity with one intent. That one weekend involved 29 volunteers from the Cub





Scouts on Saturday, 12 Girl Scouts on Sunday morning and 72 volunteers that Sunday night.

Tybee Clean Beach was started in 2012 by Tim Arnold, a self-proclaimed recovering executive. Originally from Pennsylvania, Tim and his wife, Debra, traveled extensively before retiring to Tybee in 2012 to live happily ever after. Walking daily on the beach became an act of frustration when seeing a variety of litter every day, so the Arnold's took to carrying a garbage bag with them that was overflowing by the time their walk was over. Never one to sit idly by, Tim became inspired to do something about it. As often times, the best of ideas and organizations happen through divine serendipity. Armed with a general idea and no organizational direction, Tim met up with some people who shared this frustration and were determined to do something about it - Diane Kaufman and Kathryn Propst. Thus, Tybee Clean Beach was born, a non-profit 501(c)(3) organization whose sole purpose is to get people together in a common cause to keep our beach clean. The three also started **Fight Dirty Tybee**, a preventive anti-litter campaign, and these two initiatives have proved that just a few people can make a huge difference.



Five years later, through hard work and flat out perseverance, Tybee Clean Beach has grown from a handful of volunteers to many... from school clubs, The Boy Scouts, The Girl Scouts, to United Way members, Marine Science Center volunteers, Gulf Stream personnel, Wal Mart employees, as well as Fort Stewart soldiers and our local Coast Guard! Last year alone they held over 70 clean ups involving 2,200 volunteers. That is a huge accomplishment and truly shows how much people want to save our beach and planet.

If you want to get involved, you can find out additional information for scheduled events on the Fight Dirty Tybee Facebook page or at www.tybeecleanbeach.com, where you can check the calendar and join their email list. From April through October they hold regular Sunday evening clean ups, usually meeting across from the Marine Science Center where you will be handed a free parking pass, a bucket and a grabby stick. As they sometimes move the start time and meet up location, it's best to check the website before heading out, or get on that email list.

I asked Tim what his goal was with Tybee Clean Beach and he stated emphatically, "Put ourselves out of business." That is the perfect goal! However, he won't be doing that anytime soon unless we all aspire to the same goal. Pick up your trash. Have a great time on Tybee, but take everything back with you. Do your part to keep Tybee tidy and environmentally happy. It takes no effort to walk to that trash can.

Remember, leave nothing behind but your footprints!




